How do I know if a solar energy company is a scam?

Look out for callers that create a sense of urgency, offer unbelievable deals, or solicit personal information. Legitimate solar energy companies won't ask for private information like dates of birth, Social Security numbers, or financial details. What should I do if I receive a suspicious call about solar energy?

How do I report an American Solar scam call?

File a complaint with the FBI's Internet Crime Complaint Center (IC3). Forward scam and spam texts to SPAM (7726). If an American Solar scam call tricks you into revealing personal information, you may be at risk for potentially disastrous consequences.

Are solar energy scam calls dangerous?

Solar energy scam calls can be dangerous, and falling victim to one can bring about severe consequences like financial fraud and identity theft. The good news is that there are ways to spot a scam and get out of it unscathed. Since phone scams often use the same tactics, it stands to reason that they come with many of the same warning signs.

Is a for-profit company soliciting solar panels by phone?

We have received numerous reports that a for-profit company called American Solar is soliciting by phone. The American Solar Energy Society (ASES) differs from the business "American Solar." ASES does not make outgoing solicitation calls or sell solar panels, as we do not engage in telemarketing of any kind.

What should I do if my solar system is a scam?

Report bad actors: If you encounter misleading online ads, aggressive sales tactics or false claims in marketing materials as you shop for a solar system, let regulators and advocates know. Report solar scams to the Better Business Bureau, the Federal Trade Commission or your state's attorney general.



When temperatures rise, utility costs do, too. While reputable companies can help you save money with clean or solar energy improvements, scammers offer more than they can deliver. The scams vary, but here's the gist: someone claiming to be with the government or your utility company promises big savings on your utility bills from solar energy or other home ???



Sometimes solar power companies try to collect debts that aren"t owed, or they use abusive practices like harassing calls or charging baseless late fees. Sometimes they will lie to get you to pay bills you shouldn"t owe, like promising to repair your malfunctioning system even though they don"t actually plan to do it.





I get 4-10 of these calls a day, every time a different number, and I cannot get it to stop. I added my number to the national do not call list, to no avail obviously. I do not answer these calls, I have an iPhone, so I don"t have call screening like on a pixel or anything like that.

Best way to avoid scam / spam calls is to do what @djangoose noted: don"t answer the phone unless you"re expecting a call OR recognize the Call Display information, and be diligent about verifying the authenticity of the person you"re speaking with on the other end of the phone as Call Display information can be spoofed.



This is essentially a classic bait and switch scam. A solar company uses the premise of getting 30% off solar to get homeowners to sign a lease or PPA, and then collects it for themselves. In extreme cases, solar scammers may even pose as utility or government officials trying to promote a new or unique solar program in your area.



Some scammers disguise themselves as solar energy companies and reach out to unsuspecting victims with fake offers for solar panels, installation services, or energy analyses. Look out for callers that create a sense of ???





They already know that by approaching a home on the Do Not Knock list, they are illegally trespassing, and you are completely within your rights to call the authorities. If it's a utility salesperson, you can also file a report with the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio. If the salesperson doesn''t leave, call the police immediately.

A conventional method of advertising is physical interaction with people, convincing them to install solar by going door-to-door. Many companies that install solar power misuse these benefits and lure average, everyday folks into solar panel scams. Many solar scams are from companies selling their products and services with door-to-door solar



Unfortunately, we are aware of a fraudulent group representing themselves as US Solar and making calls regarding residential rooftop solar installations.
