

The power plant will be fueled by natural gas and will utilize combined cycle technology, thus generating energy more efficiently. Moreover, the Ivory Coast aims to boost energy exports with the station's output while meeting the country's baseload requirement.

How will energy be sold in Ivory Coast?

Energy produced will be sold under a power purchase agreementwith the Compagnie Ivoirienne d'Électricité. Ivory Coast is ramping up energy infrastructure development projects in a bid to diversify its energy mix,expand its electric grid,attract sustainable investment,and boost socioeconomic growth.

Does Ivory Coast have a reliable power supply?

Unlike other countries in sub-Saharan Africa, the Ivory Coast reliable power supplyin the region, exporting electricity to neighboring Ghana, Burkina Faso, Benin, Togo, and Mali. Ivory Coast aims to produce enough renewable energy by 2030 to reduce its greenhouse gas emissions by 28%.

Will Ivory Coast achieve 400 MW solar power by 2030?

Ivory Coast aims to produce enough renewable energy by 2030 to reduce its greenhouse gas emissions by 28%. Ivory Coast aims to reach 400 MW in generating capacity from solar power by 2030. The country is building the Boundiali Solar Power Station, which will have a capacity of 37.5 megawatt-peak (MWp).

How many solar plants will Ivory Coast have?

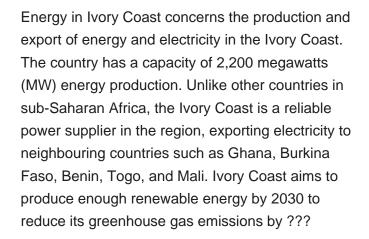
The Ivory Coast's Ministry of Mines,Oil,and Energy has unveiled plans to build 12 solar plantswith a total capacity of 678 MW. Mamadou Sangafowa Coulibaly,the Ivory Coast's Minister of Mines,Oil and Energy,has announced plans to install 678 MW of solar capacity by 2030 and 1,686 MW by 2040.

Will Ivory Coast achieve universal energy access by 2025?

With the 2030 Energy Plan identifying 66 projects that will require private investment, the door is open for new private partners to stake their claim. Ivory Coast aims to achieve universal energy access by 2025and triple its generation capacity by 2030.









Ivory Coast plans to increase renewable energy to 42% of its total energy by 2030. The government is working on multiple solar and biomass projects to enhance energy production. Hydropower remains a major source of energy, with several large dams in operation.

Ivory Coast aims to increase its installed power capacity to 3.5 GW by 2025 and 8.6 GW by 2040. As part of this strategy, the country's Ministry of Mines, Petroleum and Energy signed a memorandum of understanding (MoU) with renewable energy company Kong Solaire earlier this month to construct a 50 MW solar power plant in the Tchologo region.



Divo Biomass Power Station, also Soden Biomass Power Station, is a c. 75 MW (101,000 hp) biomass-fired thermal power plant under development in Ivory Coast. Soci?t? des Energies Nouvelles, an Ivorian IPP is leading the development of this biomass waste-to-energy infrastructure project.



Ivory Coast is aiming for an energy mix in which 42% will come from renewable energy by 2030. To help it achieve this goal, EDF signed a concession contract with the Ivorian government in December 2019 via BIOVEA Energie (owned with its partners Meridiam and Biokala, a subsidiary of the SIFCA group).





Boundali Biomass Power Station (BBPS), is a 25 MW (34,000 hp) biomass-fired thermal power plant under development in Ivory Coast. The power station is under development by EcoStar Energy Ivory Coast, the Ivorian subsidiary of EcoStar Energy, a United States-based independent power producer (IPP).
