

What is the government like in Slovenia?

The government of Slovenia is organized under a representative democratic republic with a parliamentary system. This system has been in place since just before the dissolution of Yugoslavia in 1992. Its Constitution, adopted in December of 1991, establishes 3 branches of government: executive, legislative, and judicial.

What is the difference between executive power and legislative power in Slovenia?

Executive power is exercised by the Government of Slovenia. Legislative power is vested in the National Assembly and in minor part in the National Council. The judiciary of Slovenia is independent of the executive and the legislature.

Who has the right to vote in Slovenia?

All adult citizens of the Republic of Slovenia have the right to vote for representatives of the people in general, multi-party and free elections. Power is divided into the legislative, executive and judicial branches. The holder of the legislative branch is the parliament, which consists of the National Assembly and the National Council.

What are the 3 branches of government in Slovenia?

Its Constitution, adopted in December of 1991, establishes 3 branches of government: executive, legislative, and judicial. According to this document, Slovenia is headed by both a President and a Prime Minister.

How many representatives does Slovenia have?

Slovenia has 7 representatives on the . This advisory body - representing employers, workers and other interest groups - is consulted on proposed laws, to get a better idea of the possible changes to work and social situations in different countries. , the EU's assembly of regional and local representatives.

What does a Slovenian president do?

A president, whose role is largely ceremonial, serves as head of state; presidents are popularly elected for a five-year term and can serve two consecutive terms.

Previously, it had eroded between 2002 and 2012 (by 1.2%/year), before collapsing in 2013 and 2014 (-15%/year) due to much lower demand from the power sector, the main consumer of lignite (98% in 2022).

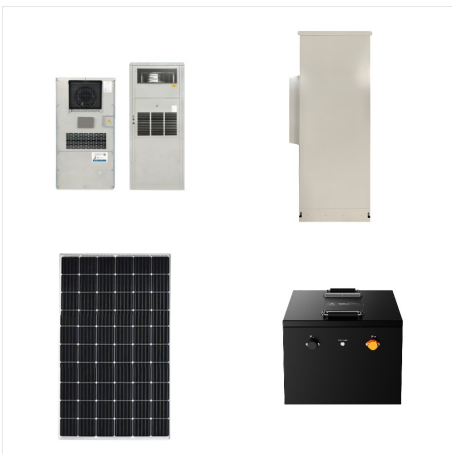

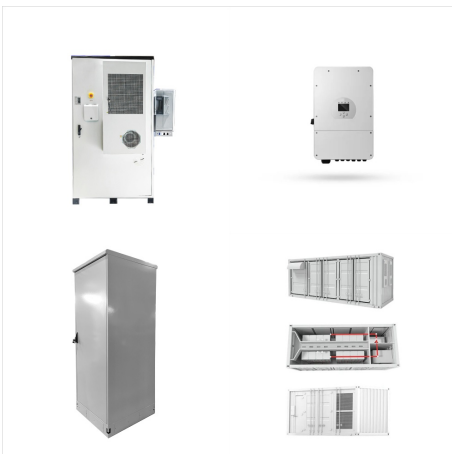

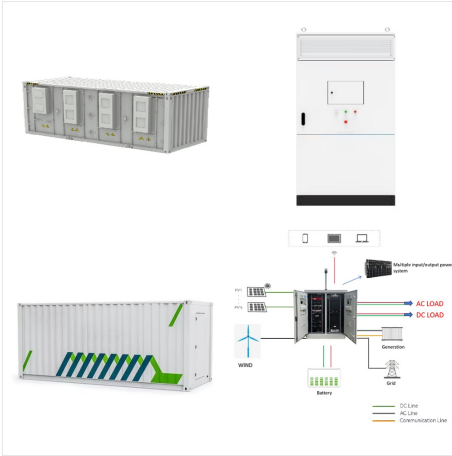
