I"ve read a ton of western comics with heavy manga influences I thought were anywhere from not bad to damn good (Kill Six Billion Demons, Monstress, W.i.t.c.h., UDON's licensed comics, etc.), but I don"t think I"ve ever read a comic that called itself "manga" that I"d recommend to someone outside of the novelty.



Throughout the "80s and "90s, manga publishers targeted the direct market by printing manga like comic books. They were flipped ??? put in the American left-to-right reading order instead of the Japanese right-to-left ??? and in some cases, like Marvel's Akira, colorized. While it succeeded at the time (issue #4 of Viz's translation of Pok?mon: The Electric ???





Nope, you probably just don"t read Western comics, but they are even more accessible than manga are. They don"t even need to be translated, the piracy sites pretty much never even get DDOSed and are absolutely gigantic with countless major ones serving comics up.


